

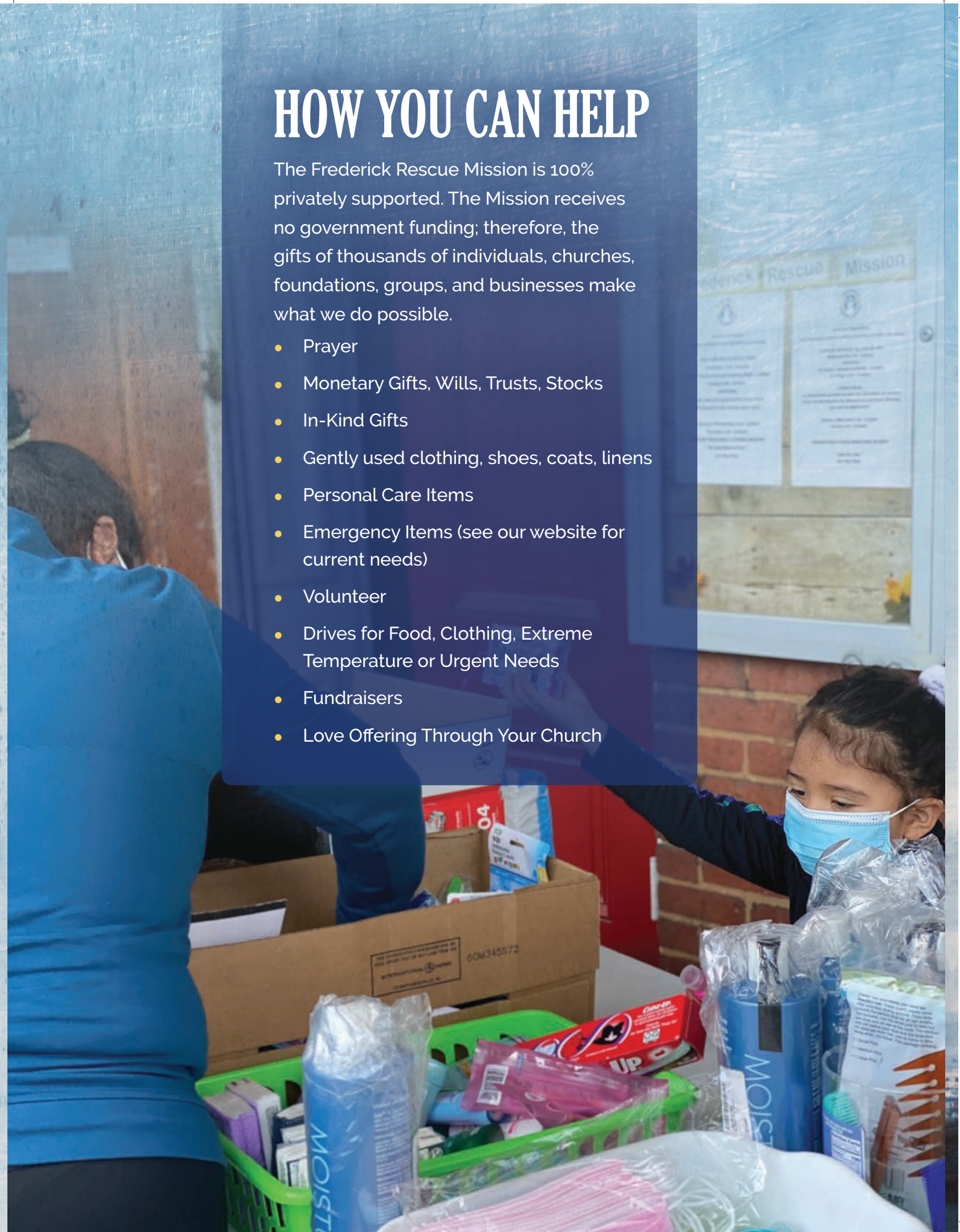

When the Mission was limited in distributing food on-site, the Mission helped other organizations with mobile outreaches. With the help of the Maryland Food Bank, nearly three million pounds of food was given within a year to those in need.

Yet the greatest example of being More than Conquerors came from those who gave to the Mission during so much uncertainty. BREAD OF LIFE KITCHEN

"We still managed to feed everyone." This is the sentiment that resounds when we reflect on the Bread of Life Kitchen this past year. Even with limited volunteers, reduced capacity in the dining hall, and the difficulty of ever-changing protocols, the kitchen remained calm and productive. We didn't miss a day of breakfast or lunch!



FOOD DISTRIBUTION CENTER

The Mission has a long history of giving food to hungry people. Last year, through our robust network of partners, we gave more groceries than ever before – meeting both new needs and enhancing existing services. We know that in addition to those coming to our campus to receive groceries, we are able to reach in their own neighborhoods those who lack transportation or live too far away.



RESCUED TREASURES

Our donated clothing ministry stays busy outfitting guests with free attire ranging from a dry pair of pants after an all-night rainstorm to a well-fitting suit for a funeral. But we don't stop there – we even take special requests, providing sought-after items when we see the donation come into the shop. This extraordinary service was demonstrated when the shop got numerous requests from the men in another local substance use recovery home. Not only were we able to clothe these guys, but every single item they needed was provided through the generosity of our donors and the astute eye of our shop coordinator.



CHANGED LIFE RECOVERY PROGRAM

Much is accomplished in a man's life during his time in the Changed Life Recovery Program, and there are many successes throughout. We celebrated when a recent former resident became lead pastor at a local church, and again when another was promoted to a manager at a thriving local small business. 2021 also stands out as the year with the most baptisms (at the churches residents attend) – men demonstrating their new life in Christ and their connection to a new community.

LEARNING CENTER

Newly opened in the fall of 2021, the Learning Center helps residents (and others who are part of the Mission family) with computer skills, GED preparation, and both higher education and career readiness. The Center already celebrated success when the Learning Center director helped a resident obtain a scholarship to Frederick Community College following his acceptance to the school. Now graduated from the Changed Life Recovery Program, this former resident has been promoted to a management position as he continues his education at FCC.



OUTREACH

We are grateful to give not just bread at the Mission, but also the Bread of Life. Bible Study was another program that returned to the Mission last year, and one guest attendee was a homeless man who was staying at the nearby Alan P. Linton Emergency Shelter. The gentleman shared that he needed a bicycle to get to his new job, and within an hour the community had responded through the power of social media. We were able to give TWO bicycles (two different men) – and safety accessories to go with them!





FAITH HOUSE

One of the blessings during COVID was having our new Transitional Living Program apartments that opened in 2020. These additional units enabled us to continue welcoming new guest residents throughout the pandemic while keeping the women and children safe in their own units when shared housing was not practical.



SUMMER ENRICHMENT CAMP

We were delighted to love on the children during our annual camp that was hosted at two locations, Frederick and Thurmont. These smaller groups found meaningful connections with the counselors, and we were able to reach into their lives in a very personal way.



VOLUNTEERS

We've always loved and appreciated our volunteers, but never more so than when we were able to welcome them back once COVID restrictions lifted. Our highlight of 2021 was seeing caring people once again fill the kitchen and dining hall, food distribution center, Rescued Treasures and the front office.

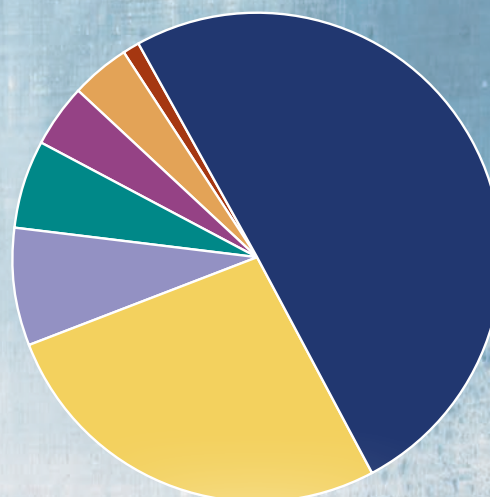

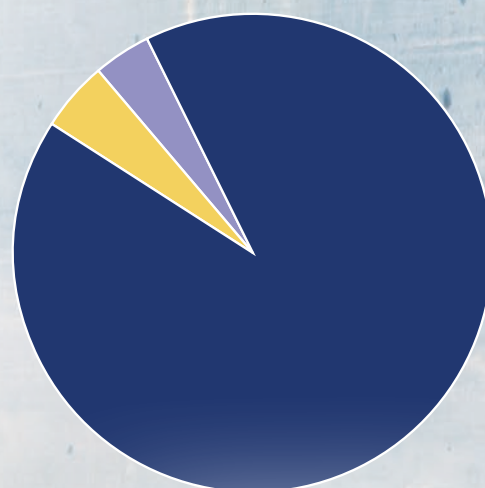
